GROUP HISTORY: "518" TEXAS CITY A.A. GROUP

The Texas City A.A. Group (commonly known as "518") was originally formed March 17, 1948. The first meetings were held in private homes. There were about four regular members (Mathie D., John M., Howard S., Carl W.) The wives, Evelyn S. and Sadie W. also attended.

In 1949, the group started meeting in Grace United Methodist Church. They were there only a few months, as the women of the church thought alcoholics were contagious. They refused to even use the cups the alcoholics had used, so they were asked to find some other place to meet.

The move was then to a room on 5th Avenue South. There were no chairs, benches or anything else that could be called seats. Apple crates were used to sit on. If you wanted a chair, BYOC (bring your own chair).

The next move was to 316 1st Avenue North. This location was used until 1965, when the group moved to 518 6th Avenue North where they still meet today.


The first anniversary was held at City Hall (6th Street at 6th Avenue North). A couple of anniversaries were held at V.F.W. Hall on 9th Street. When the Wessler Center opened, the group started holding their celebration there.


The courts in Texas City have sentenced quite a few people to A.A. Sentences vary as to the judge and the offense.

The auxiliary was formed in 1949. The name of Al-anon was adopted in 1960. Texas City had the first delegate from East Texas to the Al-anon Convention in 1964, 1965, and 1966. The same person was the first chairperson for the Al-anon convention in Texas 1961, 1962, and 1963. Celia H. was that person. She and her husband, Sam H., were active from the time they became involved with A.A. and Al-anon.


Alateen groups were formed in 1957 for the first time. In 1969, the Texas City Group formed their Alateen. Celia H. and Griz E. were instrumental in forming this group. Dances are sometimes given by the teens to raise money to go to the Texas Alateen Convention. One year, a carwash was held to raise the money.

For some 25 years, there were only two meetings a week, on Tuesdays and Fridays. In 1972, a meeting was started on Thursday nights for people who had drug problems, as well as alcoholism. In the mid-1970s, a Saturday night discussion meeting and a Sunday night Big Book Study meeting started. A Women's Sunday afternoon meeting was also started. In 1983, a noon open meeting was started Monday through Friday. In 1990, the Saturday noon meeting began. In 1991, a Wednesday night meeting started. We now have a total of 13 meetings a week.


