



## I Finally Got the Message

 $^{\prime}$  After 16 years of coming in and out of the AA program, I finally received the GOD (Gift of desperation). I got busy by taking the 12 Steps, learning the 12 Traditions, making meetings on a regular basis, and taking the suggestions that were given to me back in 1976. One of the most important things that happened to me was my sponsor told me to go to a group conscience. My question was "what's a group conscience?" He told me to attend and let him know what I learned. At 47 days of sobriety, I attended the very first ever group conscience of the New Day Group of Galveston, Texas. A few members of the 33rd St group wanted to have an early morning meeting. These members had been attending a 7:30 am meeting held at 33rd and Ave P, and they wanted to have their own group, separate from the 33rd Street group. Co-founders were Jenny S. and Jan M.

The meeting was opened with the Serenity Prayer and the next order of business was to elect trusted servants. About that time, I needed to go to the bathroom. I went to the bathroom and when I came back into the main room, everyone started clapping and said "congrats"!!!! I said Dammit, what's going on. They informed me that I had been elected secretary of the group. My comment was "I have no idea what the secretary of an A.A. group does?" Jenny S. said "sit down and shut up. We will tell you what to do". As it turned out, that was the one of the best things that happened to me.

Jenny knew that I worked in Houston and my office was about 5 minutes from Houston Intergroup. My job was to go by intergroup and pick up books, chips, and all kinds of items that our group needed. There were a few other duties such as chairing the group conscience meeting, keeping the chip container up to date, and ordering literature. Eventually, a few other groups heard about me being an errand boy, so they would have me pick up various items for them. For the first time in my A.A. history, I finally felt part of the fellowship that saved

my life.

A few years later, the group needed a treasurer and willingly stood for the position and held that position for a couple of years.

Over the years, I have participated in various group service positions. After retiring from the pump business in June of 2002, I became the GSR of the group and that was my introduction to general service. I had heard the term "general service", but I knew very little about it. My step sponsor suggested that I get a "service sponsor" that had the experience and knowledge of this type of service. I did, and eventually my service sponsor also became my step sponsor due to my other sponsor moving off the island.

At the end of my 2-year term of being GSR of New Day Group, I attended SWAARSA (Southwest Alcoholic Anonymous Regional Service Assembly) that was held in Houston in late 2004. I learned a lot in those first 2 years of general service and made the decision that there was a lot of work to be done in general service and A.A. is always looking for volunteers. Over the last 20 years, I have attended many area assembly meetings, many district meetings, many various committee meetings, SWAARSA, and regional forum meetings. I've also learned a lot more about the 12 Traditions and 12 Service Concepts.

I have been a sober member of A.A. for 30 years and I cannot begin to tell you what A.A. has meant to me. I don't care if it's group service or general service, it's a great way to show our gratitude. I also have met so many A.A. members that have become very close friends.

I would also like the thank our meeting in print (Grapevine) because in my first 10 years of the program, I was a traveling salesman that did a lot of traveling and was on the road a lot. No matter if I was on the plane or car, I also had a Grapevine with me. I have men that I sponsor that are in jail and prison that love the Grapevine and I am grateful that

was able to get them a Grapevine subscription.

There is an article on page S19 in our service manual written by Bernard Smith, Class A non-alcoholic trustee about "Why We Have a Conference" that is one of the best articles that I have ever read, I highly recommend our members read it. To briefly summarize a few points of that article, Bernard Smith explains that it is important because A.A. ensures the recovery of the child that's being born today, ensures that power and prestige never enter A.A. and that our fellowship in always inclusive, never exclusive. Those are only a few things that he points out and you can read the complete article.

In closing I want to thank all A.A.s for showing me how to have a relationship with a power greater than myself that loves me and forgives "unconditionally" and gives me the honesty, open mindedness, and willingness to align my will with God's will and to serve my fellow man. God Bless A.A. and I hope these few words may encourage some of you get a service position, take a newcomer through the steps, or do any kind of service that that will help another person stay sober and have a great life.

## "Our Imaginations Will Be Fired"

I could share about my drinking career, or the long and bumpy road that brought me to A.A. for good. But I would like to share a bit about how I obtained a spiritual experience though service work.

I have always had depression and social anxiety. I had very few friends growing up. During my drinking days I preferred to get drunk alone every day than go to bars and "make a fool of myself". I reasoned that no one was being hurt by my drinking except me, and who cared about me anyway. I had long since resigned myself to thinking that I was just no good at making friends, and worse I was oblivious to the lost opportunities to be with my own family.

At a pivotal point in my journey, I got desperate and realized that I needed to get honest with myself, with God, and with another human being, or I would ruin my life. Getting a sponsor, working the steps with all my might and heart, and practicing rigorous honesty saved my life. But I kept waiting for that spiritual experience I kept hearing about.

It wasn't long before I started resting on my laurels. I shudder to think what danger that could have led me to, had I not been just prideful enough to think, "How will A.A. survive the pandemic if I don't chair a meeting every day?" How arrogant of me! Of course, A.A. didn't need me! Blessedly stubborn people never stopped showing up at my home club even as I was afraid to leave my apartment. As it turned out, I needed A.A., and I needed A.A. far more badly than I realized.

Because I hadn't had a spiritual awakening, I had been basically spiritually asleep up to that point. I had experienced a few Promises, but not what I know now is a vital spiritual experience, a psychic change. I didn't know that I was in danger of a relapse, that one meeting every couple of weeks was not cutting it for this alcoholic. Suddenly I was attending a meeting every day, chairing multiple meetings a week, meeting new people on a regular

basis, and making friends for the first time in my adult life! I found *release from care, boredom, and worry*, even in the middle of a pandemic! My *imagination* was *fired*! I made connections, grew closer with my husband and my sponsor, and met my first sponsee! It is strange to say that during one of the most stressful times in world history, I was experiencing one of the best years of my whole life.

However, the thing I have learned about having a spiritual awakening is that I can fall back asleep. For me, this is all too easy. I have heard it said that I cannot stay sober on yesterday's program; that I must grow, or I go. I try to stay busy in A.A. Working a newsletter, for example, keeps me on my toes! It forces me to be in contact with more alcoholics than I ever have before, making even more connections, challenging my social anxiety a little every day. It helps me carry the message, keeps me sober, and keeps *my imagination fired*! That's one of my new favorite phrases in the Big Book.

For me fellowship and service work go hand-in-hand. I cannot be there for my family and not help out in any way I can, doing the dishes for my brother, or taking my dad to a doctor appointment. It's what you do for those you love. I try to be there for the fellowship because it is always there for me. That means finding a new comfort zone and thriving in it!

Besides, I know what it's like to be *stupid*, boring and glum. That was me dry and not sober. That was me apart from A.A., not a part of A.A. I used to self-medicate my depression and anxiety with alcohol. Thank God I have found a sufficient substitute, and more!
